Advent is a season that may leave you feeling, if you really get into it, like silly putty. Advent is one of those push and pull seasons. Pushing us to look to the sky for that marvelous day when the Lord returns, to make all creation new, to make obvious the all too often hidden Kingdom of God. Pushing us, yes, but also,

Pulling us back to recall and celebrate the cold morning in a barn where this God who created the cosmos, the galaxies, our sun and earth, chose to be born an infant to an unwed teenager; so to save us from our own best thinking, so to teach us what it means to be the human beings God intended us to be. Push and pull.

Yet in the longing for the future, and in the remembrance of the past, what this season truly calls us to is to look urgently at our life as it is, right here, right now. Today, Jesus walks among us, just as he said he would. He walks among us in the nobodies

of the world, in the invisible poor, in the homebound, in the elderly, in the children...

Advent is a season that calls us back to live, right here, in the now.

NOW is the time to give generously. NOW is when life happens. NOW is the time of Advent. NOW, the suffering king, robed in purple, says to us all: "Follow me!" NOW.


Heifer Project




