From Mother Jodene

Aloha Beloved in Christ Jesus.

The man lived an upright, honest and godly life. He cared about and cared for others, putting their needs ahead of his own. He had many friends and a devoted family. He faced his temptations and conquered them. He never judged people by the color of their skin, their education, their social class, their gender or age, or even their faults and failures. He knew how to forgive. He knew how to help heal broken bodies, minds and spirits. He had a sense of humor and captivated people with his storytelling. He lived the words and messages of the Good Book every day of his life. He had faith as solid as a rock.

But, in spite of all his goodness the man was designated public enemy number one. He showed up on the authorities 'most wanted' list. Finally, by the stealth of night, they snared him in a wicked trap. They trumped up charges. Fair trial? Guess again. The death sentence was his destiny. And they laughed him out of this world. His name: Jesus our Lord. Yes, we know that ultimately God won this unjust and unfair battle and raised Jesus to life from death. It is the Easter Story. However, we also know that Jesus' story of suffering and death is a classic of bad things happening to good people.

Jesus' Holy Week journey raises that age old question of why? in sufferings and tragedies and happenings that just seem to have no explanation. As full of faith in God as Jesus was, on that Old Rugged Cross he cried from the depths of his being 'My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" Jesus did not get an answer on Good Friday. It was only later that he would experience resurrection and new life. I wish I had an answer to this question when my dear priest friend Maggie at age 41 and with two beautiful

children and a loving husband was dying of a brain tumor. But at least we talked together about this as I visited and cared for her.



We talked about how suffering is a

great mystery in this life--about how good and bad alike suffer---as the rain falls from heaven on both. We talked about looking for someone or some thing to blame and about the feeling of being blamed as Job in the bible experienced. We talked about the search for a 'reason' and not finding a reason yet that seemed logical or understandable.

And, through our tears we talked about faith and hope. About how God actually grieves when bad things happen to any of God's children. We talked about how Jesus lived the depths of the unfairness and injustice of suffering. We talked about that Old Rugged Cross. We talked about an empty tomb and the Sunrise of Heaven---and that no matter what happens that God has the deepest and last words---Love, Resurrection and Eternal life. We never did come up with a definitive answer to 'why?' But, Maggie found her resurrection on this side of heaven. She found it in the peace of God which passes all understanding---a peace that sustained her and brought her the blessed assurance of hope that as her Redeemer liveth, so would she. Her family eventually found it in the blessing of a new mother for her children. This is one Easter Story on the other side of the Cross. Now we walk these last days of Lent, Palm Sunday and Holy Week with Jesus, knowing that the eternal sunrise of Heaven awaits our Lord.

WELCOME TO ST. ELIZABETH'S NEW PRIEST ASSOCIATE

THE REV. IMELDA SUMAOANG PADASDAO

St. Elizabeth's Vestry voted to call The Rev. Imelda S. Padasdao as Priest Associate at the February 2008 meeting. She will begin her ministry among us on Easter Sunday. She was born and raised in the Barrio of Masikil, Bangui, Ilocos Norte, Philippines. She is the eldest of three children of the late Florentino and Iluminada Padasdao.

Immigrating to Hawaii, one of her first jobs was with the Department of Hawaiian Homelands for ten years. She attended St. Paul's, Honolulu from1971 until 2002. At Summer Camp at Mokuleia in 1972 she experienced her calling to ordained ministry. Bishop Browning, the Camp Chaplain asked her to read the lesson and the Prayers of the People. The Bishop was very impressed with her skill.

According to Bishop Browning, she was active in helping St. Paul's and put on "many hats" of ministry. The Rev. Canon Tim P. Quintero, the founder and Vicar of St. Paul's Church and the late Rev. Fritz Minuth were greatly influential in her seeking ordained ministry.

She served many ministries at the parish and diocese as well as in the National Church. Treasurer for St. Paul's for 20 years before ordination, she also served on the Bishop's Committee. She served the Diocese and National Church faithfully as Delegate to Diocesan Convention, on the Diocesan Council, as National Episcopal Asiamerica Filipino convocation representative, and as a member of the National Women's Organization of the ECUSA.

Ordained to the Diaconate in 1986 and to the Priesthood in 1990, 'Apo Padi,' as Mother Imelda also likes to be called, became the first female Filipino Priest in the Episcopal Church and in the Anglican Communion.



Ministry in West Kauai. She has been 'the flying priest' for these families of faith. Her ability to juggle many balls has been much needed, as she continues her position at the Department of Transportation. She has been worshipping at St. Mary's since 2001.
